Title: Assessing the Global Potential for Insetting towards Climate, Nature, and Social Goals RFP No: 03282024

1. Background

Conservation International (CI) is a global non-profit organization dedicated to protecting nature for the benefit of all. Founded in 1987, CI works in over 30 countries on six continents, harnessing a combination of science, policy, and partnerships to address the most critical threats to the natural world. The organization's mission is to empower societies to responsibly and sustainably care for nature, our global biodiversity, and the well-being of humanity. Cl's approach is grounded in science and partnership, with a strong emphasis on working collaboratively with local communities, governments, the private sector, and other NGOs.

Amid growing consensus that the protection, restoration, and improved management of ecosystems can provide at least 30% of the climate mitigation needed to limit warming to 1.5°C, Cl has set ambitious targets to realize the potential of natural climate solutions (NCS) worldwide. Cl believes that realizing this potential requires managing a portfolio of NCS projects and programs. The Center for Natural Climate Solutions (NCS) orchestrates and supports Cl's efforts toward the goals of our Nature for Climate Southern Cross star, bringing together Cl staff and specialties to have the greatest possible global impact. Our teams catalyze change through transformative partnerships, spearheading events and forming robust coalitions. We produce new science, refine methods, enhance monitoring systems, and innovate investment models to bolster NCS implementation. Our portfolio showcases high-quality NCS projects, including Cl-led flagship initiatives. We're committed to accelerating business investment in NCS and stewarding corporate relationships dedicated to NCS.

2. Project Overview

Insetting is a way for companies to reduce their GHG emissions by investing in nature-based solutions within their own value chain¹. In these terms of reference, we focus on the subset of insetting that includes reductions and removals in Forestry Land-use, and Agriculture (FLAG)-related emissions that are likely² countable towards a company's GHG footprint. These solutions aim to improve the sustainability and resilience of their operations, supply chains, and products, while also enhancing the livelihoods of farmers and local communities.

Insetting offers many opportunities for companies to make progress on their Scope 3 emissions reduction targets, to collaborate with supply chain partners, to contribute to the global goals of the Paris Agreement and the UN SDGs, and to improve the resilience of their supply chains. It also offers the potential opportunity for communities and producers to be directly rewarded for improving the environmental performance and resilience of their operations while strengthening relationships with their buyers. Investment in insetting is expected to be driven by strong momentum on corporate climate commitments and clarification of key GHG accounting rules for the FLAG sector in 2024³.

Several challenges have prevented insetting action from scaling to date, and the impact potential for insetting varies globally due to a variety of factors (e.g., agricultural production systems, soil sequestration potential, national and international policies, availability of mechanisms for investing in and conveying benefit to producers, and others). Therefore, to enable a strategic and targeted approach to insetting, a global analysis is needed to identify where climate and nature objectives can be best accomplished through insetting interventions.

This consultancy will be focused on identifying where in the world insetting has the most potential to offer positive climate and nature outcomes, leveraging the highest impact areas of agricultural commodity production, in-country capacity, and connections to global supply chains and commodity markets. The goal of this effort is not to create a new definition of insetting or undertake an exhaustive analysis, but rather to highlight geographic and commodity focus areas that have the most potential for delivering positive climate, nature, and people outcomes through investment within value chains. The conclusions and deliverables from this work will inform the approach of CI and our partners on insetting.

The budget available for this scope of work is \$50,000-100,000.

- d. Amendments. At any time prior to the deadline for submission of proposals, CI may, for any reason, modify the RFP documents by amendment which will be posted to the CI website and/or communicated via email.

5. Minimum Requirements

- Experience conducting quantitative and qualitative research on agriculture as a source for climate mitigation and nature-based solutions.
- Agriculture related GIS expertise.
- Experience evaluating insetting projects, value chain interventions, and/or carbon projects in the land sector including experience in global south contexts.

- Experience selecting and analyzing large global data sets, conducting multicriteria analyses, and creating geospatial representations to demonstrate outcomes.
- Familiarity with corporate climate and nature frameworks (SBTi, SBTN, TNFD, TCFD).
- Familiarity with national climate and nature frameworks (Article 6, NDCs, NBSAPs, Global biodiversity framework (CBD)).
- Ability to generate high-quality visual outputs of the analysis that can be understood by a variety of audiences, e.g., summary graphs or presentation materials with key findings and recommendations.

Attachment 2: Terms of Reference

Objective, Deliverables & Key Tasks

Objective: Leverage existing data sets to identify where value chain action (insetting) has the most potential to support global goals for climate, nature, and people. This analysis should also specify how much of this potential is likely to be countable towards some company's scope 3 GHG footprints versus those actions which may not be countable towards a company's GHG footprint but may enable other climate or nature claims. This work is intended to inform Cl and other interested organizations as they develop their approach, prioritize investment, and design global programs aligned with or focused on insetting.

Key Tasks: The following outlines a proposed approach to reach the objective stated. As envisaged in the approach proposed below:

- 1. Task 1 estimates the total "technical" GHG mitigation potential and land area required for NCS on agricultural lands.
- 2. Task 2 estimates what portion of this potential is likely accessible by insetting.
- 3. Task 3 prioritizes this subset based on other enabling conditions'.
- 4. Task 4 identifies which companies and supply sheds have the most potential.


We are open to alternative approaches that effectively address the objective using the best readily available data within the required timeframe & budget. We are also open to suggested approaches that stagger the analysis over a longer period of time but provide preliminary findings that can enable action within the required timeframe & budget.

The following graphic offers a draft proposal for the approach for this work. We welcome bidders to propose alternative or improved approaches that leverage the best sources available to achieve the objective within the targeted timeframe and budget.

Task 1: Determine the theoretical "technical" potential for GHG reductions and removals for natural climate solution (NCS) interventions on agricultural lands segmented by geography, commodity (system)⁴, and NCS type and estimate the land area covered by this potential.

a. Propose a set of commodities and commodity systems (where multiple commodities are very commonly produced together or in rotation) to include in the analysis. Start with Food System/Food Land and Ocean Use commodities from Science Based Targets Network High Impact

Commodities List, with the most immediate priorities being those shared by the WRI deforestation drivers and covered under the EU Deforestation Regulation. This would include oil palm, soy, cattle, plantation wood fiber, cocoa, coffee, rubber, and potentially other commodities depending on expected impact potential and availability of data.

- b. Propose a minimum of three <u>types of NCS</u> to include in the scope of the analysis, which should at least include soil carbon, agroforestry, and biochar.
- c. Propose geographic granularity at which to perform the analysis based on the data available. We expect at least country-level granularity but recognize that sub-jurisdictional analysis may be possible in some areas as well.
- d. Propose key data sources to leverage for the analysis including citations and links to available literature. We expect that both spatial and literature sources will be required to characterize the GHG reduction/removals potential of a minimum of five NCS interventions by commodity system. The consultant(s) should leverage best available NCS datasets and existing public sources like <u>NatureBase</u>. A list of potential sources is provided below.
- e. Work with the CI team on up to two rounds of revision to agree upon factors described in sections a through d above.
- f. Conduct analysis.
- g. Provide outputs of analysis including GHG mitigation potential segmented by reductions vs removals, commodity (system), NCS type, and geography. Analysis should note key uncertainties and gaps in the final estimates. Outputs should be in tabular form and may also be mapped.
- h. Recommend which commodities should be carried forward into the next stage of analysis.

 Document recommendations and include consolidated and summarized visual representations to justify them.

<u>Task 2:</u> Determine what portion of the potential identified in Task 1 is likely accessible via insetting, i.e., which **commodities** in which **geographies** and international supply chains are most likely to garner investment from downstream companies for supply chain interventions to meet their climate and nature goals.

- a. Propose a combination of factors to consider in this analysis and sources for characterizing them. Some factors may include the degree of traceability in the supply chain, the portion of goods exported or sold nationally to large multinational companies, portion of sector committed to climate targets, and the regulatory requirements of the export county (e.g., imports to EU may be more likely to garner investment in supply chain interventions due to environmental reporting and due diligence requirements on EU companies).
- b. Work with the CI team on up to two rounds of revision to agree upon factors to consider within the analysis based on data availability and relevance to the analysis.
- c. Conduct analysis.
- d. Provide outputs of analysis which would include what subset of the "technical potential" developed in Task 1 is "insetting-relevant". Like the outputs to Task 1, the "insetting-relevant" GHG mitigation potential should be segmented by reductions vs removals, commodity (system), NCS type, and geography. If significant, these potential estimates should also be delineated between what is likely countable within a company's scope 3 GHG footprint according to the GHG Protocol's Draft Land Sector & Removals Guidance versus that which is likely to be excluded.

Output should note key uncertainties and gaps in the final estimates and should summarize methodology for each factor. Outputs should be in tabular form and may also be mapped.

e. Recommend which commodities & geographies should be carried forward into the next stage of analysis. Document recommendations and include consolidated and summarized visual representations to justify them.

<u>Task 3</u>: Prioritize Task 2 outcomes, applying a multicriteria analysis to determine which **countries** have the highest potential to deliver positive climate, nature, and social outcomes through insetting within these agricultural commodity systems and characterize that potential.

- a. Propose a set of key criteria for prioritizing countries and sources for characterizing them. This analysis should consider criteria that address each of the following prioritization goals:
 - Factors that would enable investment in insetting interventions longer term. These may include:
 - reliance of economy on agriculture and/or specific relevant commodities (e.g. large constituent of GDP)
 - policy conditions and priorities in-country that support or enable insetting investments.
 - projected changes in yield by commodity due to climate change
 - GHG mitigation cost-effectiveness of interventions
 - ii. Factors characterizing the potential for insetting to offer benefits to people and nature. These may include:
 - estimated social and nature benefits of interventions contribution
 - climatic changes that will increase the vulnerability of communities and threaten livelihoods that natural climate solutions may help alleviate.
 - commodity (system) contribution to global emissions and biodiversity loss (to degree the NCS interventions combat this)
 - Cost-effectiveness⁵ of interventions towards nature and social outcomes
 - Potential for Nature's Contribution to People⁶,
- b. Work with the CI team on up to two rounds of revision to agree upon factors to consider within the analysis based on data availability and relevance to the analysis.
- c. Conduct analysis.
- d. Provide outputs of analysis includes a prioritized list of countries/commodities from those identified in Task 2 to focus insetting efforts. Output should note key uncertainties and gaps in the results and should summarize methodology for each factor. Outputs should be in both tabular form and mapped form to enable visualization of overlapping criteria.
- e. Recommend which commodities & countries should be carried forward into the next stage of analysis. Document recommendations and include consolidated and summarized visual representations to justify them.

<u>Task 4</u>: Focus on 5 focus countries identified in Task 3 to identify which companies are key players in these high priority countries/commodities and what specific supply sheds/landscapes within each country have the most potential?

- a. Work with CI team to select up to 5 of the recommended countries identified in Task 3 for further analysis. CI's primary consideration in this selection will be identifying countries where CI can meaningfully engage either directly or via our partners⁷.
- b. Identify which companies source the commodities with the highest potential (based on Tasks 1-3 analysis) from these countries.
- c. Prioritize these companies based on which seem most likely to be interested to engage based on their climate and nature commitments and operating regions.
- d. Analyze sub-jurisdictional production and purchase information to identify where within each country there is the most potential for engagement (down to the supply shed / landscape)
- e. Provide outputs of analysis which would include a prioritized list of companies, commodities, and supply sheds/landscapes to focus and estimated "insetting-relevant" GHG mitigation and land area potential they represent (as a subset of the potential identified in Task 2) and characterization of the benefits analyzed in Task 3 (e.g. cost efficiency, social & nature benefits, enabling policy). Output should also offer a list of potential implementation partners and estimated investment required to achieve potential. Output should note key uncertainties and gaps in the results and should summarize methodology for each factor.

Deliverables:

- A. Outputs of analysis for each task including consolidated summary of conclusions, maps/visuals, and recommendations from each.
- B. Set of conclusions and recommendations that take the outcomes of all four tasks into consideration.
- C. Set of references for data sources and peer-reviewed literature for each task.
- D. Documented methodologies for each component of the analysis.
